Supporting communities

During 2009, the Rocky Mountain Power Foundation granted more than \$747,450 to nonprofit organizations in Idaho, Utah and Wyoming. The High Country Resource Conservation and Development Area, which encompasses nine counties in southeast Idaho, received a grant during the third quarter.

Since 1988, the foundation has awarded more than 7,870 grants totaling more than \$47.8 million.

Treat yourself to energy savings

Halloween is trick or treat time, but it also means colder temperatures – and higher energy use – are on the way. If the thought gives you the chills, here are some simple tips.

Weatherize

Don't let energy vampires suck the heat out of your home. Add insulation in ceilings and crawlspaces. Don't forget to seal ductwork and especially air leaks around doors, windows and where utilities enter. Leaking ductwork can reduce your heating system's efficiency by as much as 20 percent. Heating

The amount of energy wasted by an inefficient heating system can be scary. Get your system tuned up and clean or change its filters regularly. Set the thermostat a few degrees lower at night or install a programmable thermostat.

Lighting

Switch to ENERGY STAR® qualified compact fluorescent lighting. CFLs use 75 percent less energy than incandescent bulbs and last 10 times longer. They come in many shapes and sizes to fit a variety of fixtures.

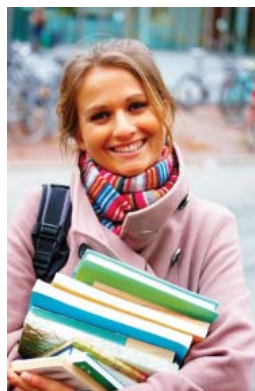

TV savings

Thinking of upgrading to a high-definition TV? ENERGY STAR® rated models are up to 30 percent more energy efficient than non-ENERGY STAR models when turned on or off. Like most electronics, newer TVs continue to use some electricity when off. When you get your TV home, set it to “home viewing” in the set-up menu. It uses less energy than the vivid setting typically set by manufacturers. To make shopping easier and compare the energy use of TVs, visit ENERGY STAR’s Web site at www.energystar.gov for a searchable database.

SAFETY MATTERS

Stay safe, look up

When working outdoors this fall, stay away from overhead power lines. Be especially careful when hoisting ladders, cleaning gutters or using long-handled tools to trim trees. When working in agriculture, lower grain augers and other tall equipment when near overhead lines and never lift irrigation pipes on end near them.

Follow the 10-foot rule – keep yourself and tools at least 10 feet away from overhead power lines. Never try to remove a branch or limb that is touching a power line. Call us toll free at 1-888-221-7070 and we’ll help remove it.

Wind generators add juice to grid

As a Rocky Mountain Power customer, more than likely some of the electricity powering your home was generated by a wind turbine. Wind-powered energy has become a high-growth resource in our electric generation mix.

By the end of 2009, we anticipate owning 892 megawatts of wind generation. Added to the 450 megawatts of wind power we purchase from other companies, our resource portfolio will contain more than 1,340 megawatts of wind generation capability – enough to meet the annual electricity needs of about 375,000 average residential customers.

We’re building an increasingly sustainable energy supply and delivery business, which includes renewable energy generation. Our 2008 Integrated Resource Plan calls for acquiring an additional 1,400 megawatts of renewable resources by 2018.

In addition, through our Green-e Energy Certified Blue SkySM renewable energy program, we offer customers the opportunity to support new renewable resources

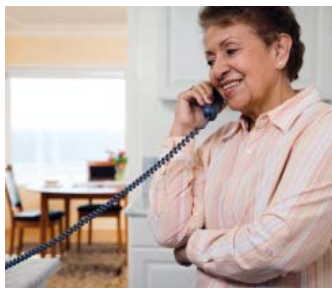
in the region above the amount we have in our generating mix to serve customers.
