Beginning May 24, when you use 500 kilowatt-hours (kwh) or less of electricity per month, your energy charge will be less than it is today – only 4 cents per kwh. Use more, and each kwh over 500 kwh will cost more than it does today – about 8 cents kwh. There's also a change in your monthly customer charge. For details, visit rockymountainpower.net/wysaver.

Here are some ways to cut your energy use:

- Set cooling thermostats at 78°F or as warm as is comfortable.

The United States uses 755 million pounds of paper a year for paper bills and check payments, according to PayItGreen Alliance. Help the environment by paying your Rocky Mountain Power bill electronically with one of our secure payment programs.

Online payment

Receive e-mail alerts when your bill is ready to be paid rather than paper bills. Pay your bill online and eliminate mailing paper checks.

Automatic monthly payment

Pay your bill by having your financial institution draw funds from your checking account each



month on the bill due date. You'll still receive a monthly paper statement to review, but there's no need to write and mail a check.

Refrigerator savings

Count to three for safety

May is National Electrical Safety month, but we ask that you practice electrical safety year 'round. Remember these three rules:

1. Look up

Contacting a power line is dangerous and can be fatal. Be aware of overhead power lines when working outdoors.

2. Call before you dig

Contacting an underground power line is also dangerous. At least 48 hours before digging to plant trees, call 811 for a free service to locate underground utilities. Or call One-Call of Wyoming directly at 1-800-849-2476.

3. Stay away from downed lines

Stay away from any power line on the ground and immediately call 911 or Rocky Mountain Power toll free at 1-888-221-7070. Never assume a line is "dead."

Children's safety

With summer coming, please remind children of these electrical safety tips:

- Never climb trees that have power lines nearby.
- Stay out of substations. The equipment is extremely dangerous. If a ball enters a substation, do not retrieve it. Call us toll free at 1-888-221-7070.
- Stay away from anything marked "Danger: High Voltage." Do not climb power poles, transmission towers and substation fences, and do not sit or play on green utility boxes (transformers).
- Avoid any power line on the ground and tell an adult immediately. Report the downed line by calling 911 or Rocky Mountain Power toll free at 1-888-221-7070.

Building a lifeline to the future

Work is underway on Rocky Mountain Power's Energy Gateway transmission expansion project to add more than 2,000 miles of new transmission line across the West. The project will meet customers' future energy needs.

In southern Wyoming and southern Idaho, the Gateway West transmission line project, in partnership with Idaho Power, will add 1,150 miles of transmission line. The project is in the planning and permitting stages. We've conducted community meetings and continue to gather input from landowners and the public. Land surveys and environmental studies on the proposed and alternative transmission routes are also underway. When completed the lines will allow us to transfer electricity to where it's needed.
